Comments:	<p>I wish to object to the above planning application on the grounds of its likely adverse impact on local wildlife and biodiversity. The ponds support various forms of aquatic wildlife. Foxes and badgers etc use the ponds for drinking water</p> <p>The proposed development site is an important habitat for a range of species, including - e.g. bats, hedgehogs and owls The removal of [trees, hedgerows, scrub, ponds, etc.] will result in the loss of</p>

nesting, foraging, and sheltering areas

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) requires that planning decisions "minimise impacts on and provide net gains for biodiversity" (para. 179). This proposal fails to demonstrate how biodiversity loss will be prevented or mitigated.

No adequate ecological survey or biodiversity enhancement plan appears to have been provided. Without this information, the council cannot properly assess the environmental impact, which should justify refusal or at least deferral until a full ecological assessment is carried out.

In summary, I believe the proposal is contrary to local and national planning policies on biodiversity and conservation and should therefore be refused.
